

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From the Executive Director

As Executive Director, this past year was filled with exciting opportunities. I attended three Executive Leadership Conferences which provided a greater understanding of CCE. We provided many successful programs in Columbia and Greene Counties.

We have forged new relationships within Columbia County with the leaders of the Youth Bureau and the Commissioner of Social Services allowing us to offer expanded programs to our youth and families. One exciting new program is called HAY (Hiking, Archery and Yoga) via a county contract that allows us to offer these services free of charge! Our Greene County programs with the Department of Social Services have received strong support throughout the county, with them exploring other options with us for the future.

We continue our commitment to existing programs including being the premier source of local Agroforestry and Climate Resilience education, supporting dozens of 4-H clubs and programs, and maintaining our evidence based in-home parenting education.

This fall we hosted our first in-person fundraiser in four years. It was a wonderful night of local food, music, and community at Liberty Farms in Ghent NY.

At both Extension campuses, we hosted a volunteer workday with the Regeneron Corporation. They helped us clear trails, plant Ginseng and general maintenance around our facilities.

We did some re-structuring of our organization, which in many ways has yielded increased collaboration across teams and with the community we serve. For example, 4-H and the Parenting Program have collaborated, as well as Climate and Master Gardener Volunteer programs.

Our 2023 Maple festival had over 300 attendees, we partnered with Wild Hudson

Valley offering an array of educational experiences throughout the day. It was wonderful to bring this great tradition back and have so many old friends of CCE attend as well as meet new members of our community!

We are excited to have hired six new staff, each with new strengths and enthusiasm. I'm confident with the team we have assembled, we will continue to bring some of the best and most accessible education to our counties. We have also retained a large percentage of our leadership team. We promoted several staff internally who are doing stellar work.

Our Master Gardener Volunteer Podcast: Nature calls won a local "Chronnogrammie" award for their exceptional Podcast!

We participated in three fairs: The Greene County Youth Fair, Columbia County and State Fair. Each helps us to further amplify the amazing work we do!

The Taste NY market we manage at the Capital Region Welcome Center had the largest sales in our history. We crossed the million dollar mark! We hosted a fantastic "Taste Turns Ten" event in May with many state and local elected officials present.

I am confident that moving into the coming year we will be able to further our outreach and connect more with our communities.

Family and Consumer Sciences

The Family and Consumer Sciences Program provides resources that advance community resiliency and family well-being. The objectives of this work are to contribute to advancing the socio-economic potential of communities, and the empowerment of people to achieve optimal well-being. We develop our programming through a plan-of-work based on locally identified needs. The goal of our programs is improved quality of life for families and individuals in the areas of personal & family development; nutrition; health & safety; healthy homes and communities; family economics & resource management and community resiliency.





Parenting Education

The Family and Consumer Sciences Program continues to offer multiple opportunities for families to receive parenting education within Columbia and Greene Counties.

The In-home Parenting Program, funded through a contract with the Greene County Department of Social Services, provides free, in-home parenting lessons to families exclusively referred by the Greene County Department of Social Services. The program currently offers in-home and virtual zoombased lessons. In our partnership with Greene County Department of Social Services, we have provided effective and empowering education to over 60 families.

The **Parenting with Confidence Program** is supported through a grant from the Dyson Foundation and is open to all caregivers in

Columbia and Greene Counties. The program currently offers in-home lessons or remote lessons via zoom. Our Parenting with Confidence Program often collaborates with other organizations to offer free, 6-8-week group-based parenting skills series. During 2023, our parenting program was able to offer 6-week series within the Greene County Correctional Facility, Columbia County Correctional Facility and Twin Counties Recovery Series with over 20 participants completing the programs. During 2023, our Dyson Parenting Program has reached over 70 families.

Dedicated parenting educators provide support to families through education, skill demonstration and as empathetic listeners for caregivers dealing with the difficult job of parenting in an ever-changing landscape. Their services are so

vital to the success of some families that they are requested to maintain a presence in their lives long after their cases are closed with DSS. We have been engaging with some families for several years who still call on their parenting educators any time they are facing a difficult situation, such as parental loss, job loss, or difficulties at school. These maintenance visits have helped families avoid further contact with Child Protective Services as they can get the help they need before the situation becomes a crisis. Our parenting educators often inform and provide our families connection to vital resources such as food and clothing pantries, affordable mental and physical health services, legal aid, educational and training opportunities by providing connections or making referrals to other community partners.


Within 2023, our In-home parenting program expanded due to funding through a contract with Columbia County Department of Social Services to provide free in-home parenting and anger management lessons to families exclusively referred by Columbia County Department of Social Services, primarily the foster and preventative units.

Over 100 families received parenting education and support through our three programs.

Anger Management

Anger Management classes were provided by a certified Anger Management Specialist I and were available to all residents of Columbia and Greene Counties. The Anger Management Program is a 12-week series. Class series are offered multiple times per year and open to the public. Our community-based classes reached over 30 participants in 2023.

In 2023, our anger management educator offered an 8-week anger management series within the Greene County Correctional facility with engagement of 10 participants. Outside agencies can partner with Cornell Cooperative Extension in order to offer 8- or 12-week series within their organizations and/or facilities.

4-H and Youth Development


Engaging Over 5,300 Youth Through 4-H Programs

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Columbia and Greene Counties offers a robust youth development program under the 4-H banner. Our 4-H programs encompass a diverse range of formats and locations, ensuring accessibility and catering to the interests of all youth, from rural to urban communities, ages 5-19.

In 2023, we reached over 5,300 youth through our various 4-H offerings. These included after-school programs, summer camps, workshops, clubs, special events, and traditional community-based programming delivered in collaboration with schools and other organizations. Through this comprehensive approach, 4-H continues to be a leading force in enriching the lives of young people in Columbia and Greene Counties.

Agroforestry

Agroforestry is the intentional integration of trees and shrubs into crop and animal farming systems to create environmental, economic and social benefits. For a management practice to be called agroforestry, it must satisfy the four "i"s: Intentional, Intensive, Integrated, Interactive. Our programs are designed to meet growers where they are at and to support their goals in land stewardship and food cultivation. Agroforestry topics include:

- Shiitake cultivation and business development
- 2. Forest Farming programs, including maple, ginseng and mushrooms
- 3. Wild, edible plants and mushrooms
- 4. Multifuncational Riparian Buffers
- 5. Silvopasture (livestock integrated with trees)
- 6. Alley cropping (short term and long term crop integration)

The Siuslaw Model Forest, our 142-acre demonstration forest, held agroforestry practices of varying scales. This year, key demonstrations were scaled up to a commercial level to meet the growing training needs of farmers and service providers. This includes the shiitake laying yard and an understory cropping demo containing many native understory plants that are used for food and medicine.

General Forestry Education

Throughout our work within the Natural Resources Program area, our team's primary focus is to support woodland owners and woodland stewards so forests are valued, cared for and expanded.

Nine programs were held in 2023 with over 300 attendees to learn about topics including:

- Winter tree ID and wildlife tracks
- 2. Growing trees with deer pressure
- 3. Chainsaw safety for landowners
- Native tree seedling distribution and planting education with over 100 trees given away
- 5. Woodland walks with a forester


Master Forest Owner Program

Our Association continues its role as regional host for this program that supports woodland owners with a free visit from a trained volunteer. These visits are typically the first step of many in woodland stewardship. 74 visits were conducted in 2023 with 40 participating volunteers assisting with management advice on over 1,606 acres throughout our region. Landowners list many reasons for requesting a visit but some themes did emerge through the year.

- Guidance on invasive removal and tree planting
- 2. Care for the health of their woodlands
- 3. Learn to identify trees
- 4. Assistance with deer pressure and impacts

Women Owning Woods

In partnership with the Watershed Agricultural Council and Columbia Land Conservancy, our Association continues to support woodland education geared towards women by hosting a local chapter of this national network. In 2023, classes offered to this network included three Women's Game of Logging class, a training on Assessing Vegetation Impacts from Deer, a Wild Woods Restoration Project native understory planting along with routine 'Happy Hour' zoom meetings.

Agriculture

In 2023 the Association participated in a variety of outreach and educational programming. Our goals for 2023 were to open communications to farmers about resources, as well as learn from them about their needs. We also began to explore mentorship models between new and seasoned farmers. Conducted over 56 farm visits in Columbia and Greene Counties. We listened and learned about the needs of our Agricultural producers. Our understanding grew throughout the year. Connecting farmers with regional teams who are seeking tech support, fiscal support, course offerings on a variety of topics, soil health, climate, grants and etc.

From these meetings we are working with our regional team, the Hudson Valley Lab and Cornell to offer new and revamped educational opportunities.

Climate Change & the Environment

Climate Resilience in Communities

With continued support from the NYS DEC Hudson River Estuary Program and NYS Water Resources Institute, our staff supported seven municipalities with efforts to enhance climate resilience in their communities. Some of the projects we assisted communities with in 2023 include climate smart planning, roadstream crossing management, climate adaptation and resilience planning and formal submittal for Climate Smart Communities Certification. 
Climate Change Adaptation and Resilience Planning Pilot

A new exciting initiative was launched this year in partnership with the Capital District Regional Planning Commission supported by funding through a statewide Climate Leadership Services contract with NYS DEC. This initiative was to facilitate a Climate Resilience and Adaption Planning effort with Columbia County and a cohort of 17 municipalities in the county. Through this process Columbia County communities have recognized the impacts from climate change, assessed local vulnerabilities and



identified ways to adapt. Our staff outreached to municipal officials, volunteer climate leaders, emergency services personnel and community members, providing education and guidance. This community engagement involved public educational presentations, facilitated stakeholder workshops, municipal meetings and community surveys. Taste NY



The Taste NY Market at the Capital Region Welcome Center celebrated its fifth year in operation in 2023, having opened its doors in November 2018. The store was staffed with nine full-time and two part-time staff members. Additionally, a seasonal part-time worker provided support during peak summer weekends.

The market continues to showcase a diverse and ever-evolving product selection sourced from New York State farms and producers. In 2023, we welcomed new vendors including Cat's View Farm (Germantown), Stoneledge Farm (Leeds), 6 Brooklyn Brittle (Brooklyn),

Chicacelitas (Utica), 9 Mile East (Saratoga Springs), and Belle's Barkery (Hudson Valley). We continued to foster a strong relationship with Jourdin's Syrup (West Coxsackie). Their sugar bush, visible from the Welcome Center entrance, exemplifies the market's impact on local businesses. Jourdin's has seen significant sales growth through exposure at events, promotions, and connections facilitated by the Taste NY Market.

We actively pursued marketing opportunities by increasing outreach and sampling events. Our efforts allowed us to expand sampling days at the Columbia County Fair from three to five. The Taste NY Market made its debut at the Greene County Youth Fair, further promoting local products. A highlight of the year was the "Taste Turns 10" event. We hosted the NYS Ag and Markets Commissioner, local representatives, and regional producers, solidifying our commitment to the community.

The market achieved significant success in sales and foot traffic throughout 2023. Data from the NYS Thruway Authority indicates a near doubling of visitors to the Welcome Center (480,000 in 2022 to 850,000 in 2023). This translated to a corresponding increase in transactions at the Taste NY Market, rising from 67,500 in 2022 to 110,000 in 2023. This growth propelled the market to surpass \$1.2 million in sales for 2023. Consistent with industry trends, peak sales continued to occur during summer months and major holidays (Thanksgiving, Christmas, Memorial Day, and Labor Day).

The Taste NY Market at the Capital Region Welcome Center remains a vibrant hub for local products, fostering economic development and community engagement. We look forward to continued success in showcasing the best of New York State agriculture in the years to come.






Finances
